Paul's Epistle

Dear Friends,

Our faith holds to a deep wisdom that caring for others and being concerned about the world serves to generate joy. Meaning comes in a package that is too large for anyone to wrap up and place under a tree. A vital part of meaning is simply recognizing the goodness and God-ness of human existence. So, celebrate a New Year and embrace the opportunities of 2024.

I do not believe it will be a year without major struggles in the fight to preserve democracy in America. We will need large hearts and people who call out the lies of politicians who deny the truth. One of the great saints of American democracy and inclusive love is poet Walt Whitman. There is a beautiful passage in the preface to Leaves of Grass that I recommend as an inspiration for our life in 2024:

Love the earth and sun and animals, despise riches, give alms to everyone that asks, stand up for the stupid and crazy, devote your income and labor to others, hate tyrants, argue not concerning God, have patience and indulgence toward the people, take off your hat to nothing known or unknown or to any man or number of men, go freely with powerful uneducated persons and with the young and with the mothers of families, read these leaves in the open air every season of every year of your life, re-examine all you have been told at school or church or in any book, dismiss what insults your own soul, and your very flesh shall be a great poem and have the richest fluency not only in its words but in the silent line of its lips and face and between the lashes of your eyes and in every motion and joint of your body.

Some of the blessings of living in Grand Junction include how easy it is to love the earth with its carved grandeur in every direction, to appreciate the sun especially if you have lived in a place like Seattle, and to just adore the mountain sheep who share our hiking paths in the Monument. There are multiple reasons why people have a sense of contentment about living here. I celebrate that in 2024 we have a ongoing commitment to serve the homeless and the needy in our community. I am amazed that we have two support centers for GLBTQ persons in vital locations in Grand Junction. When I asked 2^{1} /2 years ago about where there was GLBTQ equality center in town the



EARTH CARE THIS MONTH:

ELIMINATING PLASTIC IN THE HOUSEHOLD

I have done research on removing plastic from my home. At first it was daunting even thinking about it. I decided to talk with my partner to see where she stood on this subject because we had to agree how to approach this change. I could hear the gears turning in her head. "How can we do this"? "Why should we do this"? "We already do our share in recycling". We do recycle but this is not enough. Two reasons why we should live without plastic. 1)The health risks are enormous because the chemical compounds seep into our food. Here's what I know: the chemical chlorinated plastic contains a wide range of synthetic polymer which are made of nylon, Teflon, polyvinyl chloride, and polyethylene terephthalate. By using plastic tubs to store our food, plastic water bottles, plastic to heat food in the microwave, we are putting all these chemicals into our system. When we send plastic to the landfills it is buried and then the chemicals seep into our groundwater. Once the plastic compound is introduced into our bodies it causes hormonal imbalance, obesity, cancer, nerve system damage and several other abnormalities. 2)The environmental impact happens when plastic is dumped into the oceans and breaks down into tiny particles. These particles are called "nurdles". Nurdles are smaller than 1/5th of an inch, this is smaller than a BB. Plankton eat the tiny particles (nurdles), fish eat the plankton, marine animals and humans eat the fish. These nurdles infiltrate not just the oceans, but also the air, land, and other bodies of water. According to the book "Living Without Plastic," there are more than 165 million tons of plastic in the oceans and it's growing. Marine life also gets caught in plastic. Strips of tarps, plastic from beverage cans and larger pieces of plastic wrap around them. Often the animal cannot break away. They either drowned, are severely injured or deformed.

There still is hope. Start now by doing a few simple things. Don't buy plastic water bottles, use a cloth bag for your groceries, buy bamboo combs and toothbrushes.

There are so many more things, little things, that we can do. Read articles like this one and educate yourself and then take more actions.

MISSION & OUTREACH NEWS

First Quarter Mission & Outreach January Collection

For our first quarter mission focus for 2024, the Mission and Outreach team would like to support The Gift of Love, Inc., a local non-profit organization that is dedicated to bringing love and hope to many people in Mesa County. The organization started in 2018 by providing care packages for domestic violence clients at Hilltop's Latimer house. Realizing that even more people in Mesa County would feel less lonely if they expanded to other needs, they started raising funds to make more packages to be donated to other causes.

Today the Gift of Love serves babies all the way to seniors, and each care package is designed for the individual person it is given to. For example, seniors may be in need of food items, hygiene products and warm socks. They also enjoy fun items like candy, snacks, and crossword puzzles. For kids, they do stuffed animals, toys, and games. Brain injury clients receive basic necessities like water bottles and snacks. They try to see what each recipient needs and then add in special gifts to help them feel loved.

We would like to start in the month of January by focusing on senior citizens living in nursing homes and/or assisted living facilities. Let's collect hygiene products such as body lotion, hand sanitizer, dental products, shower gel, and shampoo as well as non-slip warm socks and lap blankets. In February, since that is the month for Valentine's Day, we will focus more on fun items such as puzzles, art supplies, coloring books, colored pencils and squishies (good therapy for folks with arthritic hands and fingers) as well as candy and snacks.

Brittney Bade, the director of The Gift of Love, will visit our church service on Sunday, January 21st. She will tell us more about the organization and its needs at that time. As always, thank you for your donations and support of this worthy cause, bringing joy and love to people who might otherwise feel lonely and unloved during the cold winter months.

Come enjoy a program of music, stories and a candlelight vigil for peace. Hear about life in Gaza and the West Bank, and the impact of the Palestinian Children's Relief Fund (PCRF).

This event is being held by a coalition of G.J. churches to raise money for humanitarian aid for children in Gaza. Speakers include Dr. Barbara Zind, Pediatrician and PCRF volunteer; Hanan Zand, who grew up in the West Bank, and Steve Sosebee, President and founder of PCRF.

Since 1992, the Palestinian Children's Relief Fund, a 4-star (Charity Navigator) nonprofit, has provided free medical care and support for Palestinian children. The Gaza Relief and Recovery Campaign will supply medication, food, clean water and other necessary supplies to families affected by the conflict. In the first week of the current war, PCRF provided \$1.7 million dollars of aid.

For those who cannot attend, you can still be a part of Gaza's recovery.
