Paul's Epistle

Dear Friends,

Recently, after church a couple shared an experience they had at a Friday night dinner party. When they disclosed they were members of First Congregational UCC, another guest asked them: "Is that church still...different?" My answer to that would be "Yes, we love being different!"

We want to be different.

We welcome all God's children and celebrate the children of God that other churches would exclude or label "different."

We dare to speak out against the threats to democracy that are endorsed and supported by white Christian nationalists.

We have the courage to question any passage in the Bible that would betray the compassion of Jesus with scriptures of ancient tribal violence and bigotry found in various chapters of the Bible.

We are different enough to proclaim we follow the compassion and teachings of Jesus and not the 66 different books in the Bible with over 40 authors. People who claim to follow the Bible are delusional when authors clearly contradict each other. The honest question is "which chapters" in the 66 books do you actually follow and teach? Our answer is the chapters that reveal the compassionate actions and teaching of Jesus. In 39 years, I have never had a sermon looking at chapters on Kosher diet plans.

We are stunningly different in honoring the truths and wisdom of other global faiths in sermons and our educational programs. We are different in having an open and voted upon budget. I dare anyone to go to Joel Osteen's church or any megachurch and ask for a lineitem budget. They will treat you worse than a crew from 60 minutes. Leaders will hide their actual line-item budget. Many megachurches become like the Trump White House, a family business with family employees in key positions. They are not going to show you their budgets!

We are different in wanting to work together for the good of the community on projects with Roman Catholics and Evangelicals such as Sharefest and the Mother Teresa Apartment House. We do not anticipate they will join us in support for GLBTQ community projects or Black Lives Matter events.



We are different in truth telling. Churches that remain silent about the Trump Cult in this country are not confronting the greatest threat to democracy since the Civil War. Trump is telling us what he wants to do when praising Viktor Orban and Putin as the greatest world leaders. The compassion of Jesus has to come first and critique selfish, authoritarian political plans of both parties.

We are different in working to build bridges of peace. Our church shared a key with the local synagogue after it received threats. I have reached out to a church that is under the authority of Patriarch Kirill of Russia who persecutes priests who will not support Putin's war crimes. I let them know if they had any threats that they could evacuate to our church and contact the police. Can we oppose Patriarch Kirill and also offer safe refuge to his church members? Yes, because we are a little different. And Jesus is different from many who call themselves Christians.

Second Quarter Mission & Outreach March Collection Kids Aid

The Mission and Outreach team has designated Kids Aid as our second quarter 2024 project. Kids Aid is currently serving 113 sites in Mesa County, at 3,000 kids per week. Kids Aid provides food for children who are in need of weekend food. To quote Tessa Kaiser, Executive Director of Kid Aid, "Every bag we send out of our warehouse, all 3,000+ on a weekly basis, has a name, a face, a heart, and a tummy we are filling."

In order to continue their commitment to feeding these children, Kids Aid needs financial support from our community. Our church will be donating \$400 to this effort. Just \$4 provides a weekend food bag for one child, so the money we give them will go a long way towards helping the organization meet its commitment.

In addition, we would like to ask our congregation to donate granola bars of any kind, which Kids Aids will use for the food bags. Starting on April 1st, there will be a labeled bin across from the church office where you can place your donations.

February 18, 2024

The church council of First Congregational Church United Church of Christ met in the chapel on February 18, 2024 for the monthly stated meeting. Present were council members Karen Caton, Mary Endres, Kathy Goe, Cindy Haas, Carolyn Holmgren (moderator), Julie Krueger, Michael Petri, Ken Puhler, Janis Woodley and pastor Paul Ashby. Ron Rucker and Rachel Seiff were absent. Visitor: Andrea Bartlett, Connie Pyle and Beth Rakestraw (church administrator).

A quorum was established. The meeting was opened with prayer by Paul at 11:31 a.m.

Minutes of the January 21, 2024 council meeting were approved as distributed.

Pastor's Report:

- Paul attended a Building Bridges event at the synagogue and reported that the congregation is very appreciative of the help and support provided by our church.
- The folks from the new members class couldn't agree on a date to all join the church together.
- Asked for volunteer mentors for the new members.
- ♦ The new large TV in the chapel is working out well for different classes and activities.
- A pro-choice group in interested in using some building space for a few organizational meetings. The council approved allowing the group to use the facility for these meetings at no cost.
- A copy of a letter to [editor redacted] from the Boy Scouts of America was received. Due to some problems at a scout gathering, [...] is prohibited from all involvement in scouting until such time as additional information is obtained and an informed decision can be made. Paul asked that anyone who sees [...] at our facility report that to either himself or Beth.

Karen noted that the Rocky Mountain Conference of UCC is looking for some new people for the finance committee. They'd like to have more representation from outside of the Denver area.

Finance Reports: The End of Year 2023, Budget Report & Balance Sheet were reviewed by Julie. Pledges, plate offerings and rentals all came in over budget, while expenses came in about \$1,000 under budget, mostly due to not hiring a video tech person.

The committee is planning to renew efforts to encourage legacy gifts to the church. Michael agreed to help with that. They also plan to reinvigorate the City Market donation program since many newcomers may be unaware of this benefit to the church.

- Set Date for May Annual Congregational Meeting The date was set for May 19 immediately following the worship service.

Since the council is above the minimum size, no other candidates are needed but Connie was asked if she'd be willing to serve on the council and agreed. There may still be a need to add someone else as a lay delegate.
- Sound System Beth expressed frustration getting the final pieces of the sound system improvements in place. A few suggestions were made.
- ♦ Membership Review Michael, Beth, Paul and Martha reviewed the membership rolls and suggest several changes (to be effective as of 12/31/2023).

MODERATOR'S MUSINGS CAROLYN HOLMGREN

Greta Vosper in her book *Amen* quotes a study by Lionel Tiger and Michael McGuire in their book, God's Brain. Serotonin, they explain, is a neurotransmitter in the brain which is responsible for our feelings of well-being, like a "happy pill" (Vosper's description.) It is released in the brain when we receive messages that indicate that we are recognized as being of value. This can come from something as simple as someone saying your name, smiling at you, or offering a handshake.

Vosper points out that religious communities, like FCUCC, are ideal environments for giving and receiving positive messages which provide a "squirt" of serotonin. So, consider what effects your simple gestures of friendship can have on others and yourself. If you would like a model of friendly welcoming behavior, watch Joanne Drake when a visitor comes to worship and coffee hour.

Past work in these districts has increased turnout so much that historic numbers of candidates are now willing to run. Primary voting promotes consistent voting habits, and greatly increases the likelihood of voting in the fall. Our postcards inform voters of where and when to vote, as well as key issues at stake.

If you are interested in participating in this effort, please plan on attending our first meeting for this election year, which will be held at 11:15 a.m. on Sunday, April 21st in the library. At this meeting, we will watch a short orientation video, receive supplies and start writing postcards. If you are unable to attend the meeting, but would still like to write postcards, please contact her by phone or email prior to the meeting.
