Paul's Epistle

Dear Friends,

I recently had one of those "Ah Ha" moments during an Interfaith dialogue Zoom meeting hosted in Kyoto, Japan. It was a discussion on what is the foundation for ethics in all faiths. We used the word "precepts" rather than commandments to focus on positive acts of ethics rather than "thou shalt not" orders. When one Rinzai Buddhist group came up with their list of 10 precepts it dawned on me that's

exactly what we strive to embody at church. It was an "Ah Ha" moment of mutual respect and affirmation. Yes, there is a core of ethics that different faith groups can affirm as real-world family values for the human family.

So, I challenge you to see the compassionate heart of Jesus and First Congregational in these 10 precepts written by people from a different faith and non-Western culture:

- 1. Affirm Life ~ I respect all sentient and insentient beings and always act with compassion toward them. In gratitude, I do not take my own life for granted.
- 2. Act Generously ~ I act with generosity and open-handedness. I receive only things that are freely given to me. I remember that clinging and attachment are the root of suffering
- 3. Be Loving ~ I am conscious and loving in all of my relationships. In sexuality, I discern the difference between love and lust and do not take advantage of human beings.
- 4. Manifest Truth ~ I honor honesty and truth. I speak with integrity from the depth of my heart.
- 5. Respect Clarity ~ I act at all times with mindfulness and clarity. I do not abuse my body or cloud my mind with misuse of intoxicants.
- 6. Honor Silence ~ I remember the preciousness of silence.
- 7. Celebrate Others ~ I rejoice in the good fortune of others. I do not, through my thoughts, words or actions, separate myself from others through coveting, envy or jealousy.
- 8. Be Giving ~ I give generously of myself, sharing freely my love, my gifts, my talents and my abundance for the benefit of all. I do not selfishly withhold. I do not add any more suffering to the world.
- 9. Embody Compassion ~ I recognize and enlighten my greed, anger and ignorance. I transform my negative emotions and act with equanimity, sympathetic joy, compassion and loving kindness.
- 10.Steward the Earth ~ I hold sacred this planet Earth. I seek to understand Nature's interconnections and celebrate my own interdependency. I work toward achieving a lifestyle that gives more back to this Earth than I take from it.


Take the time to enjoy the cooler weather and the beauty of the aspens these next few weeks because the holiday season will ramp up in November.


NO ABC SOCIAL THIS MONTH

AUGUST COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES MICHAEL PETRI, CLERK

August 17, 2025

The church council of First Congregational Church United Church of Christ met in the chapel for the monthly stated meeting on August 17, 2025. Present were council members Karen Caton, Cindy Haas (moderator), Julie Krueger, Michael Petri, Connie Pyle, Ron Rucker, Kathy Viglianco, Allan Weinand and pastor Paul Ashby. Guest: Beth Rakestraw (church administrator) and Terri Wenzlaff. Absent: Kathy Goe, Rachel Seiff and Janis Woodley

A quorum was established. The meeting was opened with prayer by Julie at 11:28 a.m. The minutes of the June 15, 2025 Council Meeting were approved via e-mail prior to the meeting so they could be included in the Tower Chimes newsletter.

Completion Strategic work session: Note - The council met on August 3 to work on developing a strategy plan. Strengths, weaknesses and opportunities were discussed. The session was led by Julie Krueger. No actions were taken at the work session and no minutes taken at that session.

Julie reviewed the summation of the discussions of the meeting and the decision to distribute a questionnaire to the congregation for input on the direction of the church and future areas of focus. The surveys are to be returned by mid-September.

Ministry Team Reports/Minutes: Available reports were distributed prior to the meeting, as noted:

- Fellowship & Hospitality Meeting, July and August 2025
- Mission & Outreach Meeting, July and August 2025
- Worship and Celebration, no meeting
- Property Team, Summary Report
- Gardens and Grounds, Verbal Report
- Finance and Stewardship, June and July 2025 Meeting Minutes
- Finance Reports: 2nd Quarter 2025 Balance Sheet and Budget to Actual were distributed prior to the meeting. The finances through mid-year continue to be solid. It was noted that Brian Mahoney has retired from the Finance Committee after many years of faithful service.

Pastor's Report:

- Paul asked the committees to start considering their budgets for 2026.
- We Love, We Listen, We Help T-shirts have been ordered and should be available before the pride parade.
- Bishop Allen has agreed to be an emergency contact while Paul and Pam are on vacation from September 9 through October 1.
- Paul noted that the UCC in Santa Fe had a "make a will Sunday", marketing to retirees who have moved there.

Other Business:

The following resolution from the Finance Committee was read and approved, on motion:

On Sunday, August 17, 2025, the Council of First Congregational Church, UCC, Grand Junction, Colorado, in its authority to conduct church business on behalf of the membership between congregational meetings, and with a quorum established, approved the following resolution:

RESOLVED, that the following individuals are approved signators on accounts held in the name of First Congregational Church and shall have authority to conduct financial transactions on behalf of the First Congregational Church, UCC

Julie Krueger, Treasurer Nancy Palubicki, Member of Finance Committee Martha Jones, Financial Clerk Cindera Haas, Moderator Kam Macar, Member of Finance Committee

Authority to conduct business shall extend to both written and verbal authorization of the sale of stock on behalf of the church, with proceeds payable to the church, the opening of accounts and making investments in the name of the church. This resolution supersedes any previous authorizations.

Martha Jones mentioned that more lay delegates are needed – they often have trouble establishing a quorum for the meetings. She feels we need 3 alternates. It was suggested that this concern be included in the Church Chat weekly newsletter with Martha and Karen as contacts.

Some "lost" inactive members had been missed in reviews of the church membership rolls due to being archived from the Breeze membership database while still listed as inactive. Several are deceased now. On motion, the council voted to drop the remaining lost member, Marilee Moore, from the inactive roll.

Michael noted that he could find no records indicating when many people were dropped from the church rolls. A review of the church bylaws shows that there's no requirement for the council to approve dropping members. This is the section of the bylaws:

Article V Section 3 INACTIVE MEMBERS: The Clerk shall review annually a list of those members who, in the last year, have not attended the church's worship at least twice (not including Christmas Eve and Easter Sunday services) and who have not contributed to its support. After consideration of circumstances, and in consultation with the Senior Minister, the Clerk may recommend to Church Council the transfer of these members from the active to the inactive membership list. After two (2) years of inactivity these persons may be removed from the church rolls.

Michael suggested that the church bylaws be updated to stipulate that members may be removed from the inactive roll after 2 years with approval by the council. In the meantime, a motion was made and approved that the council must approve the removal of members from the inactive roll.

There being no other business, the meeting was closed at 12:07 pm.

FOURTH QUARTER MISSION FOCUS: MUTUAL AID PARTNERS

The Mission and Outreach Committee has chosen Mutual Aid Partners for the last quarter of the year. They will receive a check for \$1,000, and their executive director will attend church to receive the check and tell us about the program.

They are requesting for the month of October donations of dehydrated meals, wool socks, and sleeping bags. The socks and sleeping bags can be used, as long as they are gently worn and clean.

The following is from the director: "MAP is a grassroots organization, rooted in the values of mutual aid, focused on community building, advocacy, and education through a platform that reduces food insecurity and centers accessibility and connection between community members, resources, and organizations in Mesa County.

"Since starting in the summer of 2020, MAP has assisted over 85,000 families through the weekly distribution of essential resources including food, clothing, hygiene essentials, period products, and facilitated access to education, health care, shelter and housing stability.

"Born from an immediate need to fill support gaps during the 2020 pandemic, MAP's work has evolved into a deep-rooted commitment to nurturing sustainable projects that are equity-driven, lower barriers, and create systemic change, demonstrating that MAP's impact goes beyond meeting basic needs."
