Paul's Epistle



Dear Friends,

When I see the photos of masked thugs of ICE abusing people, I am reminded of how far we are from the Biblical ethic of caring for immigrants. We often forget the ending of the Christmas story. Mary and Joseph save their child's life by escaping an evil king and becoming immigrants to Egypt. The do not return to Israel until the corrupt, power-hungry, fear-filled angry king is dead.

Before we get into a political debate I do affirm, we need a rational, orderly process for immigrants with a 12-year path for citizenship that includes employment and no criminal record. As a follower of Christ's compassion my question is, "How do we treat Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus when they have crossed a border without proper papers?" My first step is family historical honesty. When my family immigrated to Virginia over 350 years ago, they had no papers, no government permission, no Green Card or Immigration Visa. Before Ellis Island and 19th century immigrant processing, people just came to America. We even let in Canadians who just walked across the border and settled in Louisiana. Those French Canadians make some of the best food in America and my favorite fast-food place has those Cajun and Creole roots (Popeye's Chicken which began in New Orleans). So be honest with your family history. Many of our ancestors came to America seeking a better life and had no papers or passports or permission.

Reflect on the Biblical passages that speak to how we should treat foreign immigrants. So not only does God command us to welcome the strangers, God's heart of love does not want us to push them around:

- ⋄ "Cursed is anyone who withholds justice from the foreigner, the fatherless, or the widow" (Deuteronomy 27:19).
- ⋄ "Do not take advantage of a hired worker who is poor and needy, whether that worker is a fellow Israelite or a foreigner residing in one of your towns" (Deuteronomy 24:14).
- *Administer true justice; show mercy and compassion to one another. Do not oppress the widow or the fatherless, the foreigner or the poor" (Zechariah 7:9-10).
- "So, I will come to put you on trial. I will be quick to testify against sorcerers, adulterers and perjurers, against those who defraud laborers of their wages, who oppress the widows and the fatherless, the deprived the foreigners among you of justice, but do not fear me" (Malachi 3:5).

- "Let foreigners live among you wherever they like in whatever town they choose. Do not oppress them" (Deuteronomy 23:16).
- "You are to allot it as an inheritance for yourselves and for the foreigners residing among you and who have children. You are to consider them as native-born Israelites; along with you they are to be allotted an inheritance among the tribes of Israel" (Ezekiel 47:22).
- ♦ "Let no debt remain outstanding, except the continuing debt to love one another, for whoever loves others has fulfilled the law" (Romans 13:8).
- ⋄ "Love does not harm to a neighbor, theretofore love is the fulfillment of the law" (Romans 13:10).
- ♦ "Do not forget to show hospitality to stranger, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it" (Hebrews 13:1-2).

You can add to this all the teachings of Jesus and his love-in-action toward Samaritians. Do you think Jesus ever forgot his childhood as an immigrant in Egypt? In this month as we celebrate the Christmas story, let us read the entire story of a child of God whose life was saved through a desperate act of immigration without permission.

To this day it is one of my favorite Christmas songs because I can still hear his voice in my memories.

OCTOBER COUNCIL MINUTES MICHAEL PETRI, CLERK

October 19, 2025

The church council of First Congregational Church United Church of Christ met in the chapel for the monthly stated meeting on October 19, 2025. Present were council members Karen Caton, Kathy Goe, Cindy Haas (moderator), Julie Krueger, Michael Petri, Connie Pyle, Ron Rucker, Rachel Seiff, Kathy Viglianco and Allan Weinand. Guests: Beth Rakestraw (church administrator). Others from the congregation were present for discussion of the church survey results.

The church survey discussion part of the meeting was opened with prayer by Julie at 11:33 a.m. Following this discussion, visitors left (except Beth). The council meeting business started at 12:18. A quorum was established.

On motion, the minutes of the September 21, 2025 Council Meeting were approved as distributed.

Pastor's Report:

- ♦ Paul thanks those who filled the pulpit during his vacation.
- ♦ God & Country movie is scheduled for Wednesday in the chapel. He encouraged all to attend.
- Asked for volunteers to deliver stewardship messages over the next few weeks during the worship services.
- ♦ Noted that the planned Halloween Party on Oct 31 will be relocated to the church building.
- Noted that he's offered the use of our building for use in forums on democracy by Indivisible Grand Junction.

Ministry Team Reports/Minutes: Available reports were distributed prior to the meeting, as noted.

- ♦ Fellowship & Hospitality Meeting, October 2025 meeting
- Mission & Outreach Meeting, October 2025 meeting
- Worship and Celebration, no meeting
- Property Team, Verbal Summary Report There is a significant leak in the CE building roof. The problem is being investigated but a new roof may be required on the north side of the building (the south side roof was replaced in 2017). The council agreed that this would be a good time to evaluate our costs of maintaining the building compared to the rent it brings in annually (currently about \$22k) since the building is not used for any church-specific programs. Michael volunteers to organize this effort.
- ⋄ Gardens and Grounds, no report
- Finance and Stewardship, Next meeting October 29

Other Business:

- Pew Cushions Michael noted that the foam padding in the sanctuary pew cushions has significantly deteriorated and suggested we look into replacing them. The council agreed for Michael to get some estimates.
- Annual Budget Meeting Date The council voted to set the annual congregational meeting to review and approve the budget for December 14, following the worship service.
- ♦ There being no other business, the meeting was closed at 12:46 p.m.

- Use your bank's BillPay service to automatically send a check to the church every month. Most banks have this as a free service.
